OVER VIEW OF THE ORGANISATION

Lake Gardens Women & Children Development Centre (LGWCDC) Kolkata is a nonprofit organization. It was founded in 1992 by social scientist Ms. Cäcilie Sircar with the inspiration of her late husband Mr. Shyamal Sircar

Cäcilie Sircar received the Karl Schurz Prize of the city of Erftstadt for her life's work in January 2005 and the Federal Cross of Merit on April 22, 2014.

LGWCDC is registered under West Bengal Society's Registration Act 1960 with Registration No. S/73111 of 1992-93 and under Foreign Contribution Regulation Act 2010, with FCRA No 147120533 (FCRA renewed in 2016).

All donations to the Organisation are exempted u/s 80G of IT Act 1961

LGWCDC is working with an integrated holistic developmental approach wherein joyful learning, remedial education, opportunities for mainstreaming, health care, vocational skills training for income generation are provided to the children and women residing in the targeted slums.

The main vision of the organization is to address and combat related problems of malnutrition, ignorance and poor health status including the education of the children. Moreover, the organization emphasizes on awareness programs on health, nutrition and physical and mental growth and development of the children.

The major focus of the organization is securing rights to women and children through empowerment of women by forming SHGs, making community people aware regarding their basic rights, with emphasis on women's rights, child rights, health & hygiene issues, education and self-reliance.

We work on a community based and rights' based approach for integrated and holistic development in specific slum pockets of Lake Gardens, Kasba-Kolkata Municipal Corporation and Santoshpur-Maheshtala Municipality.

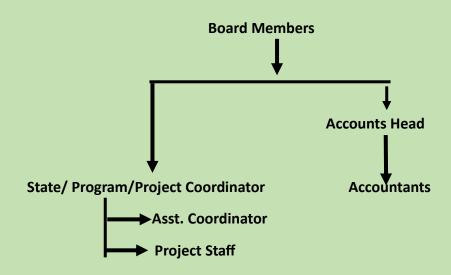

AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

To provide centre based educational facilities to the children through joyful learning to reduce the drop-out rates and to prevent potential child labour.

To improve the health status of girl children and their mothers through health awareness, primary health care, supplementary nutrition program and nutrition training.

To improve the health status of underweight and malnourished and simultaneously make the community people aware regarding low-cost nutritive food and healthy living practices.

To promote and strengthen women's organisations in our project area in Lake Gardens and Santoshpur, focusing on savings and micro-credit.

To impart skill training to the young girls and women to inculcate alternative income generation activity as another mode of occupation.

To build up stake holder network in the community area along with various, NGOs, GOs, Clubs and Government Officials.

POLICIES & COMMITTEES

Human Resource Policy

LGWCDC is an organization which cares for all of its employees as family members. The organization believe that its strength lies in the hands of the people who are like — minded and who are working in synergy with each other. Our Human resource Policies are specific and satisfies the content and requirements of all individuals.

Child Protection Policy

Lake Gardens Women & Children Development Centre has its own Child Protection Policy (CPP). Our committee is robust and has taken training of all the three modules for the same. There are regular meetings and sessions on Child Protection in the community.

Committee Against Sexual Harassment

All our employees are our family members, and that is how we care for them. All of them should feel protected, safe and secured to work with dignity. To safeguard them, we have created our own CASH Committee. This committee is comprised of employees of all genders and also have a member who is an external person – our well- wishers. Though we have never come across any such undignified instances, yet if ever any employee of any gender feels disgraced by the virtue of act of another co – worker, he / she is free to file a complaint and proceedings are done accordingly.

PROJECTS

Empowerment of Women and Children through Education, Healthcare and Vocational Training sponsored by Freunde Und Forderer e.V. Erftstad, Germany.

Mother & Child Course

This Course is one of the flagship programs of LGWCDC. Every year 20 new mothers are trained on child rearing practices. The course duration is of 1 year and classes are held once a week for 2 hours duration. During these classes mothers are made aware of milestone developments of children, breast feeding, child spacing, family planning, low-cost nutritious food etc. Once a month a Paediatrician also checks all the children and required medicines are also provided free of cost. This year also 20 mothers enrolled in the Course.







Remedial Coaching

Education is a prime focus of all activities of LGWCDC and accordingly a Remedial Coaching Centre has been functioning from the inception as a safeguard against school drop out. The Centre functioned in three batches from 10.30am to 12.00pm, 12.20pm to 2.30pm and 4.00pm to 6.00pm. Within this time the children are provided with supplementary nutrition and mid-day meal. All the children are assisted with their school work. Apart from this, recreational facilities like dancing, drawing and craft classes were also held. 30 children attended the Centre in the last financial year.







Vocational Training

Empowering women by providing them with upgraded skills and alternative employment opportunities is another key focus of LGWCDC. Keeping this in mind and as per needs of community women Courses in Handicraft and Beautician are conducted. Both the courses are of 1 year duration.

Handicraft Course

In the handicraft course, the women learn various kind of embroidery stitches, cutting, sewing and tailoring. Those who successfully complete the course are also absorbed in the Handicraft Production Unit of the Organisation. The course is held in 3 batches 11am to 1pm, 2pm-4pm and 3.30-5.30pm. In the last year



Beautician Course

In the Beautician Course the women learn basics of Manicure, Pedicure, facial, waxing, body spa, hair spa, and body massage. In the last year, 12 students successfully completed the course.



Cultural Programs

Apart from imparting education, LGWCDC believes in all round development of a child and therefore conducts dancing classes. The children are trained to perform on stage. They are also informed about the different festivals of India and some of them are observed in the Centre like Rabindranath Tagore's Birthday, Janmashtami, Id and Christmas. On these occasions cultural evenings are held where children put up some dance performances.







Handicraft Exhibition

As a fund-raising activity every year LGWCDC organises and participates in Exhibitions to exhibit and Sale the handicraft Products made by the Women Group members. This year also LGWCDC participated in Exhibitions organised by Voluntary Organisations namely Nari Seva Sangha and Kreetika, Christmas Market organised by The German Consulate Kolkata.







Annual Program

This year LGWCDC stepped into its 30th Year. To mark this occasion, on 19th November a cultural program was held at CLT ABAN Mahal in Dhakuria, Kolkata. The creche children danced to the tunes of Nursery Rhymes, while the elder children performed a dance drama, the women group members sang songs and recited poems. A magic show was also held for the children which they enjoyed very much. The program was graced by Mr.Manfred Auster, German consul General and his wife, the KMC Councillor of Ward 93 Ms.Mousumi Das and representatives of Funding Partner Organisations.

Ward 94- Madartala, Jhilmil Basti, Hatat Basti

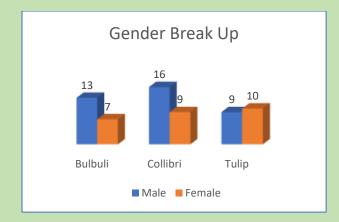

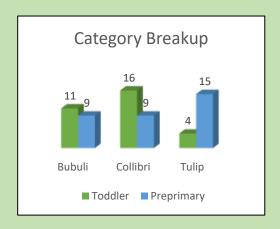


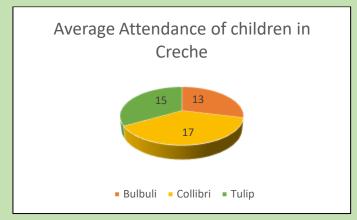
Creche Services

Regular crèche services continued in Bulbuli, Collibri and Tulip creche with 65 children - Bulbuli (20), Collibri (25) and Tulip (20) and the average attendance was 13 in Bulbuli, Collibri-17 and in Tulip -15. The children were segregated in two groups into toddler (below 3.5yrs) and pre-primary (3.5 to 5 yrs) and teaching learning activities were conducted according to the concept of early childhood education. Creche children were also encouraged to participate in drawing, art and craft activities, singing, story- telling, etc. This year the 32 creche children from all three centres took part in cultural programme on the occasion of 30th Annual Day celebration of LGWCDC at CLT Hall Abanmahal, Dhakuria, Kolkata.







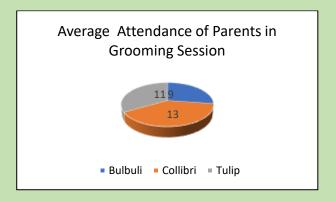


Out of 17 eligible children, 15 were mainstreamed this year. The parents of 2 other children requested the Project Team to keep them in the creches for another year as they have elder children and the school timing of both the children would be different and therefore difficult for the Parents to drop them and pick them up from school. Considering the issue these two children were allowed to attend the creche.

Parents Grooming Session

Grooming of the parents is another component of the project where the main aim is to empower the parents, specially the mothers; socially, economically and politically. The grooming class were held every Wednesday, where the mothers were encouraged to read news-paper, short stories. They were guided to prepare budget for family and also make a calculation before cooking to avoid misuse. Mothers were groomed about draping of sarees, wearing of proper dresses according to place and occasion, immunisation of the children, MR vaccine of children. They were also trained on well-being analysis and individual goal setting. Through the well-being and goal setting sessions, mothers were able to identify their current lifestyle situation and how they want to see themselves within one year. They were encouraged to set their goals and make action plans to reach their desired situation which would empower them economically, socially and politically. Mothers were also informed and assisted to have Adhar card, Voter card and Pan card etc. They were also guided on linking Ration card with Adhaar card which is now mandatory in West Bengal for having ration services. Creche mothers and few community mothers were guided about healthy practices during summer to stay healthy and fit. Beside that grooming session was held on gender equality, rights of women, functional literacy (train them on checking the date of packaging and expiry date of packaged food items, medicines, products available in tetra packs and

bottles) not to use plastic bottles for more than six months, on different government schemes, eligibility and the guidelines for applying for the schemes etc.





Community Awareness Program

Regular awareness sessions were held in the community on COVID 19 and the community people were motivated to take the vaccines from Government Health Centres. Although at first no one was interested to take the vaccines but through constant motivation about 50% of the community people in the Project area took the booster doses. All Project staffs are also fully vaccinated along with booster dose.

Several Awareness sessions were held on family planning methods in collaboration with Parivar Seva Sansthan where mothers were motivated to adopt temporary as well as permanent methods for preventing unwanted pregnancy. Two mothers were motivated and underwent ligation. Rest were given pills and condoms free of cost. A gynaecological camp was held in Parivar Seva where 19 mothers attended and got free consultations on various gynaecological issues. Out of them 5 mothers were advised to remove Copper-T as they were suffering from pain in back and lower abdomen, due to prolonged use of copper-T. They were advised for further medication.



A special drive was held by Government of India (National Health Mission) to administer MR vaccines to children in age group 9 months to 15years. All the KMC schools, Government Primary & Secondary schools had organised vaccination camps. But due to lack of awareness and ignorance many children did not attend the camp. The TVO team through community awareness session, home visit to the former crèche children and community children motivated the parents to take their children to school and health Centre for vaccines. Children of Tulip Creche got vaccines through ICDS centre of the area where the camp was inaugurated by respected councillor Mrs. Lipika Manna. The Bulbuli and Collibri crèche children received vaccines from head office of LGWCDC as it was one of the vaccination centres of KMC. All 63 creche children (97%) were vaccinated. The children who have history of convulsion during fever were not given the vaccines. Awareness session was held on Breast cancer and self-screening were demonstrated.

Several awareness programmes were conducted in community on child trafficking, good touch, bad touch, domestic violence, save water, stop using of plastic bags, waste disposal, dengue, malaria, and WASH component. Through street play awareness building was held on saving environment and stop using of plastic bags and using of eco-friendly material. After the programme in community level, the people are now throwing plastic bags, garbage in particular bin or garbage collecting carts. As their rooms are very small, they have no place to keep dustbin in their house, so many times they throw garbage in nearby railway track, pond or canal. But they stopped throwing plastics in drains which used to clog the drainage systems and cause water logging. During community visit, mothers were motivated to carry ecofriendly bag along with them to the market to avoid carrying plastic bags. In the community street play was held on saving water. One community meeting was also held in presence of representative of local councillor, local club members on saving water and closing the taps after filling up the buckets. Earth Day, Environment Day and Water Day were celebrated and mothers were informed about importance of celebrating these days in grooming classes. Local pond and local canals were cleaned. Community people were constantly motivated not to throw garbage, plastic bottles, plastic bags in the canal or ponds, but still many local people are ignorant, unaware and do the same. Cleanliness of the locality is a major issue. Initially no one took the responsibility of cleaning the area. People were constantly motivated to maintain a clean and safe environment to protect the health of the children and adult which will lead to decrease in sicknesses like cough and cold, diarrhoea, skin disease. Now it is noticed that Madartala water bodies are cleaned by local people and they segregated the plastic items and kept aside, later Corporation vans came and picked them up and took them to compactor machines for disposal. Community people were motivated to collect bleaching powder from the Health Department of Borough Office and sprinkle it in the locality.





Awareness sessions were held with mothers on Child Marriage, Child Abuse, Child Trafficking etc. No cases of early marriage were reported. One incident of child abuse was reported. A girl child of fourteen years old was molested by an aged neighbour. The accused was arrested immediately after local youths, community members informed local police station. TVO team assisted mother to local police station and was given mental support to give the confession of scenario. She was also given mental support that it is not her daughter's fault and the accused is guilty. The case was filed under POCSO Act and the accused is under trial. From local police station mother was requested to submit documents of bank account as compensation money will be transferred to her daughter's account from government. But due to improper document still it was not possible to open a bank account in her name for the compensation to be transferred.







School Awareness Program

The TVO team also worked with several schools like Tollyganje Girls High School, Rajnarayan Basic Junior School, Kashba Ballika Vidyalay, Kushum Kumari Vidyamandir, Rajendra Shikha Sadan. Sessions were held in schools on ecology, environmental issue, good touch bad touch, proper hand washing, WASH component. Through school awareness programme, children were aware regarding safe and unsafe touches. Many of smaller children shared during the session about their experiences and teachers will talk with parents. The TVO team also after discussion with children, identify the families (from project area only) and also build rapport and collected other information. No such molestation cases were reported from the schools.









Networking with Stakeholders

The project team visited ICDS centre on regular basis. This year, a good rapport was established with the AWW and AWH. The ICDS AWW and school teachers told. that children are not availing the services provided by the ICDS centre. They shared their overall activities. Mothers also shared their experiences about ICDS centre and the service they received. They shared repeatedly that due to non-availability of toilet facilities parents did not send their children to ICDS centre. The mothers of community and crèche children were encouraged and motivated to send children to the ICDS centre for availing the services but unfortunately the mothers were not interested to send their child regularly to the centre. They complained that centres are not cleaned properly, there is no toilet facilities, no one takes their child to toilet rather they call mothers. In Rangkal area under Bulbuli crèche in ICDS centre there was no electricity and two centres functioned together, many Saturdays the centres were not open,

irregularity of AWW and AWH. No system of pre-primary activities. Now mothers only go and collect the food from the centre. Community mothers, crèche mothers were motivated to participate in "nutrition week" along with TVO team. The TVO team is constantly motivating the mothers to submit the petition or the letter to CDPO for betterment of ICDS service but unfortunately mothers, community people are very reluctant to avail the services.

Linkage and advocacy were held with health department, local councillor, borough office and other allied NGO. A stakeholder's meetings was held in December 2022 where representative of councillor, ICDS AWW and AWH, Parivar Seva, other allied NGOS, women's group, child line, crèche mothers, local club member, Health Club a unit of Swastha Bhavan participated. Women's group and crèche mothers shared their activities and discussed on how friendly & effective linkages can be done in a better way.





Integrated Community Development Program sponsored by Kindernot Hilfe e.V, Duisberg, Germany

Overview of the Project

The Integrated Community Development Project is being implemented in 4 communities of Santoshpur area namely 16 Bigha, Podirhati, Kanhuli and Aynalpara located in Wards 8,10, 11,16 of Maheshtala Municipality in District 24 Pargana South. The project addresses the sustainable development of community through empowerment of Self-Help Groups and Cluster Level Association members by achieving the Social, Political and Economic goals set by them. In this year the majority of the activities were organized by the CLA member's right from planning to implementation. However, it was found that all the CLA members were not actively participating and some of the most able ones had taken up full time jobs so it was not possible for them to be a part of the team. As a result, few members had to do all the work and therefore would get demoralized at times.

Since, the SHA model emphasizes on self- dependency without giving any monetary benefit hence this sometimes created a barrier as there are other agencies working in the community who are showering them with money as loan as and when needed. Although they have to pay a high premium to repay this loan it was hard at times to make them understand this fact. To make them self-sufficient various awareness programs were held with officials of Municipality, Bank, Labour department etc. and camps were organized to open bank accounts, pension accounts and submit forms to get government benefits. Two out of four slum pockets being unregistered slums its residents did not get any Government benefits. Moreover, due to lack of proper sewerage system there was water logging in many parts of the community during the heavy monsoon season. As a result, children had to wade through

dirty water to go to school and were at risk of being infected with various water borne diseases.

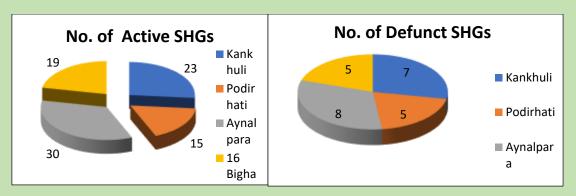
The Balwadi Centres were handed over to the CLA members as KNH discontinued funding of the centres. However, due to fund crunch CLAs were unable to run all the Centres and at the end of March 2023 only one of the Centre at Kankhuli is functioning properly. The two coaching Centres are also functioning properly where remedial coaching is being offered to children aged between 6-10 years. This initiative has put a check on drop outs and also deterring the children from being involved in anti-social activities. In association with another Project of the Organisation, children of the community got an opportunity to get trained and participate in Rugby matches thereby ensuring their right to play.

To maintain ecological balance, the SHG members developed kitchen gardens but due to excessive rains it all got washed away. The youths of the community became members of the West Bengal Youth Network. They participated in different workshops on Gender, Child rights, Ecological rights etc. and along with SHG members conducted garbage cleaning, tree planting drives, rallied to protest against the use of plastics and management of e-waste, organized sit and draw competitions, poster competition & wall graffiti. A theatre workshop was also organized for the children on ecological issues.

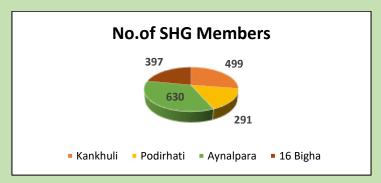
Social issues like domestic violence, elopement, early child marriage, engagement in child labour and adolescent girls migrating and getting involved in entertainment world, is still rampant in the area and to combat these awareness programs were held. Emphasis was given on child rights and women's rights. Interactive sessions were held with Police and Childline personnel to resolve issues.

To combat malnutrition, expert dieticians took sessions on how to cook low-cost nutritious food with locally available vegetables. Some SHG members started their own business, while others engaged themselves in group business, but due to improper planning, the business did not thrive and left the members dejected and de-motivated. To overcome this issue, trainings on income generation activities and business planning and analysis, were conducted. Another burning issue is migration. Due to better work opportunities, some families have migrated to other cities and states and as a result, SHGs have broken up. To deal with the issue new SHGs have been formed and members of broken SHGs have been linked with existing SHGs.

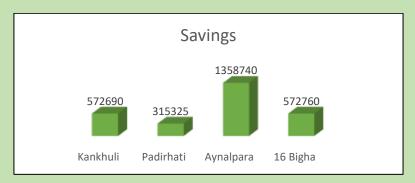
Since the Project is in exit phase, the main emphasis is on strengthening of CLA, and Formation of Federation. They will be given training on forming new SHGs, strengthening existing SHGs, CLA goal setting, FLT, fund raising activities etc. We have also planned to link the SHGs with the Government, so that they get the government grants.



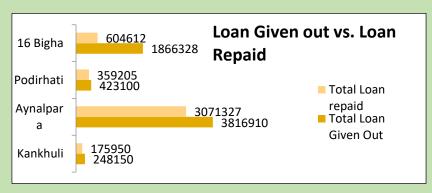
Since initiation of the project a total of 111 SHGs were formed but over the years 24 groups became defunct due to migration of members and conflicts within the group which could not be resolved. Currently there are 87 active SHGs



As on 31st March 2023 the total number of active SHG members from 87 SHGs was 1817



In all 4 communities the savings is less because of members leaving the group and irregular savings. The amounts are in INR.



Loan repayment in 16 Bigha is extremely low at 34% while in the rest 3 communities the repayment rate ranged between 70-85%.

The objectives of the Project are:

- Promote qualitative educational support for children
- Fullfillment of Health and nutrition needs of the children and community has improved.
- Families with enhanced skills and adequate knowledge on micro enterprise development have improved livelihood opportunities and gain economically
- Women in the community have increased participation in development issues affected them and their children and resolve them effectively.

In the last financial year the activities conducted to achieve the objectives are mentioned below:

Promote qualitative educational support for children

Sensitization meeting with Parents:

Meetings were held with two new SHGs as it was observed that their children were not attending School every day. 31 parents attended the session. The parents informed that children are playing with mobile phones and schools are not functioning properly. They were suggested to discuss the matter with CLA member and also attend parents' teacher meeting of school and discuss the issue.



Hand holding with Anganwadi centres:

The program was held at Project office with ICDS teachers, Coaching teachers, Balwadi teachers, CLA members and staff. 25 members were present in this meeting. The objective of the meeting was to strengthen the network with CLA Members, Coaching teachers and ICDS Teachers. It was emphasised that no children should be out of school and all children under 5 years should avail the services of ICDS Centres. CLA members will then ensure that all children are mainstreamed and are attending coaching centres so that they do not drop out.



Coaching Centre run by CLA:

Two coaching centres functioned successfully with a total of 26 children aged between 5-15 yrs.



Day Care Center for children of working mothers:

One Day care center was opened last year for children of working mothers aged between one to five years. The Centre functioned from 9 am to 2pm with 25 children. These children were provided with supplementary nutrition and mid day meal. The children were divided in two groups — Toddler (1-3 yrs) and Pre-Primary (3-5yrs). Both the groups were imparted training on early childhood education through joyful learning methods. Additionally, all pre-primary children were given training on school readiness.



Children's Sports:

A sport's was organised for the Children, SHG members and Staff along with CLA members. A total of 91 persons participated. In three groups 10 events was done in the sports. 1st, 2nd and 3rd Prizes were given to the winners of all events, consolation prizes were given to all other participants.



Functional Literacy Training

13 sessions on FLT were held in all four communities and office where 203 women participated. Apart from this, with support from TCS, an adult literacy training course was started. The course duration was of 3 months. The second batch comprised of 15 women who successfully completed the course and were awarded certificates. The women are now prepared to conduct this training at the field level.





CRSA Activity:

Four CRSA Session was done in the four community with 147 children. Through these sessions children learned about their rights, the roles and responsibilities of duty bearers in the community, the support mechanism that is there in the community to protect the rights of children.





Fulfilment of Health and nutrition needs of the children and community has improved.

Health Clinic/ eye camp/ other camp:

One eye camp was organised at office in association with VRX Labs with 144 participants. 124 participants were detected with vision problems and got spectacles free of cost, 8 participants were detected with cataract and they were referred to Rotary eye hospital for free surgery. One general health checkup camp was organised at office. The CLA members took the responsibility of organising the camp and informing all community members about it. 80 persons from all communities attended the camp. All were given free medicines. Special cases were referred to specialized hospital as per need. This camp enabled the CLA members to raise funds.





Demonstration of low-cost nutrition:

7 programs were held to demonstrate cooking of low cost nutritious food with locally available vegetable in all four communities. 406 men and women participated in these programs. They learnt how to make indian bread made with flour batter, boiled potato garnished with lemon, corriander and other spices, flaked rice puloau, onion fritters,

chowmien, vegetable fritters, lentil soup with drumstick flowers and leaves (anti virus nutrition). The sessions were taken by nutritionists who also informed the methods of cooking like covering the pot while cooking so that the nutritional value is retained. They also informed about the nutritional value of each ingredient. These programs enabled the mothers to learn new and tasty nurtritious items which will prevent malnutrition among children.



Nutrition Week Observation:

In all four communities programms were organised by CLA and SHG members. In these programs community members gained knowledge on nutritional value of various foods. A total of 3 programs were held where 149 women participated in these sessions. After getting training on preparing low cost nutrition the CLA and SHG members prepared some of those items and sold it during nurtrition week in the community. This enabled the CLA to raise funds.



Health awareness and routine deworming Camp:

A total of 2 programs were held with 152 community people by CLA Milan, Bikash, Unnati, Jyoti, Natun Shirsti. In this camp session was held on general health issues. Dr. Monoj Kumar Das who emphasised on proper immunization of children, deworming etc. The children were checked and medicine for Worms, cough, cold and fever were given as per need.

Training on Business Plan:

4 sessions were held with 72 SHG members of all four communities as per KNH Module. A total of 106 members attended the training. After this training the SHG members gained knowledge on how to prepare business plan.





Income Generation Training:

This year, 20 women underwent training in liquid soap, detergent, dish wash making. The training was imparted by Pragati research Institute. They got hands on training in preparing the products. They also visited the market where raw materials can be purchased at low cost and were oriented on how packaging is to be done in attractive way so that people purchase. They were also trained on how to do cost analysis.







Identifying issues among the SHGs and regularise them:

A total of 7 sessions were held for 70 participants. Discussions were held on how to motivate the members to attend group meetings and make savings in group regularly, resolve issues of timely loan repayment, disputes among SHG members. These discussions helped the SHG members to identify the issues within the group and resolve them effectively.





Strengthening of existing SHGs and formation of new SHG

In this year 18 new groups were formed. CLA members are forming these groups and increasing members in the group. Strengthening all groups and giving them trainings. The old

SHG women try to motivate them to join the existing SHGs where there is less number of members or form new SHGs.70 community women joined in existing groups and new groups.



Training on operational management to the SHG leaders such as accounts management, book keeping, conflict resolution:

A total of 8 sessions were held in all four communities with the SHG members. 151 members participated. The main topics of discussion were book keeping and conflict resolution. With these trainings, SHG members are now able to maintain their own record books in a proper manner.





Leadership and Cluster formation:

Four sessions on Leadership training as per KNH Module were imparted to all the CLAs



Training on Advocacy & Lobby Building:

Four sessions were held with a total of 210 participants. In this the discussion was on what is Advocacy, need of advocacy and how to do advocacy. Also, interaction was held on effective communication with District Legal Aid Services Authority South 24 parganas, Consumer forum and Rotary Club of Calcutta Sutanuti. Another session was held on child marriage and gender equality, domestic violence — what needs to be done if there are such incidences in the community and how to file for RTIs, different sections in D.V.





Networking with GO/NGOs, local clubs, stakeholders etc:

Two session was held during the year with a total of 185 participants. The community members discussed the problems faced in the community with stake holders IPP8, ICDS, Anganwadi, Rabindra Nagar Police station, Councillors, Child line, Local Club members, Rotary Club of Calcutta Sutanuti, Legal Aid service representative of Municipality.





Information dissemination Camp:

Five sessions were held with total 294 participants the discussion on different schemes of State and Central government like PAN card, Laxmir Bhandar, Sastho Sathi, Job Card, Widow Pension, old age pension scheme, Samajik Suraksha Yojona, Ration card. Also, discussion on child marriage prohibition act, how to get help from CWC and child line (1098) by legal aid services. They themselves need to identify their inner strength, weakness and then need to come out from there. Assistant Super of Bidhangarh Post office also shared Information about Sukanya Samriddhi Yojana.





Monitoring and report writing Training:

Three sessions were held with total 89 participants. The discussion was on monitoring and reporting and why it is important for all as Organisation, as SHGs and CLAs. They were oriented on how to maintain the Registers properly so that all in the group can get a clear idea about the group activities by going through all documents, photos etc.





Leadership training with visit to other NGOs working with CLAs:

4 CLA members went to Rajasthan for an exposure visit organised by KNH. This is big change for us because earlier we faced difficulties to send any CLA members out of station and night stay was not allowed from the family. Now they can motivate their family and fight with the community.





Women in the community have increased participation in development issues affected them and their children and resolve them effectively.

CLA Strengthening:

Twelve sessions were held during the year where it was discussed on how they will organise meetings, select moderators, process of conducting the meeting, Secretary, President, Treasure's and Finalize the Sub committees and their responsibility. With the trainings received they are now able to assist the SHGs in preparing monthly reports, strengthen them, form new SHGs and include members in SHGs. They are running the Coaching centres, conducting Adult literacy, demonstrating preparation of nutritious food, and organising health camp & Sports. 166 CLA members participated in the trainings.





CLA Goal setting Training:

10 trainings were held during the year on how the CLA members will prioritise and set their goals, forming of sub committees, and reassessment of goals. 93 CLA members received the training.





CLA Zonal Level Monthly Meeting:

Eight meetings were held throughout the year. In these meetings CLA discussed about the progress of the respective SHGs about their group goals, the programs that they will organise in the community. Rotational fund is disbursed to Groups from where SHG started group business.





Child Rights Week Observation

This was observed through different activities like child rights and Gender Equality. Discussion on basic Rights, Right to Survival, Right to development, Right to protection, Right to participation were held in four groups. Children also participated in Rugby tournament at Maidan, organised by Jungle Crows Foundation as part of Right to Play. They visited Botanical Garden and from there, they became aware about the environment and how a balance needs to be maintained for a sustainable ecology. Total of 119 children participated in this event.







Orange Day Observation

Women shared how they had faced violence at home and how they had overcome it. Now SHGs and CLA members are also helping them to fight against violence. This motivated others to raise their voice against violence. They were also informed about laws related to domestic violence and the method of lodging complaints. Women participated in different games like Lighting the candle, Passing the ball, balancing marble on spoon etc. They also took out a rally on the streets demanding equal rights and opportunities.





Women's Day Observation

Discussions were held on women's rights, importance of International women's Day. Total of 99 women participated in the program. They shared many strong stories and different ways, and their learning's. They participated in a competition on essay writing and story telling competition on Women's Day. Prizes were given to the 1St, 2ND and 3rd winners. All were very happy and some of them shared that they participated for the first time in such an event and were glad to have been provided with this opportunity.





Campaign on Ecological Rights & Promoting Right to Play sponsored by Terre des Homes, Germany

Environmental degradation is the disintegration of the earth or deterioration of the environment through consumption of assets, like, air, water and soil. Air pollution, water pollution, garbage and pollution of the natural environment are all challenges for India. According to World Bank experts, between 1995 through 2010, India has made one of the fastest progresses in the world, in addressing its environmental issues and improving its environmental quality. Still, India has a long way to go to reach environmental quality similar to those enjoyed in developed economies. Pollution remains a major challenge and opportunity for India. Environmental degradation is one of the primary causes of diseases, health issues and long-term livelihood impact for India. The major causes of the environmental degradation are modern urbanization, industrialization, over population growth, deforestation, etc. Environmental pollution refers to the degradation of quality and quantity of natural resources. Different kinds of the human activities are the main reasons of environmental degradation. The waste products and smoke emitted by the vehicles and factories increase the number of poisonous gases in the air. Unplanned urbanization and industrialization have caused water, air and sound pollution.

In this context, Youth Groups have been established and Youth Networks have been formed in different states of India, where terre des hommes is actively working with local partners. The Youth Network of West Bengal has been active since 2012, being established following a

National Level Youth Convention organized by Terre des Hommes Germany in Bhopal. At present in West Bengal 36 youth groups have been formed and these groups are associated with the organizations such as Lake Gardens women & Children Development Centre (Kolkata), Pehchan Foundation (North 24 Pargana) and NEWS (South 24 Pargana). In the last 10 years, the youths have addressed issues of water preservation, solid waste management (plastics), promoting organic farming and promoting tree plantation. The campaign started by State Youth Network – with the aim of strengthening of the state level youth network, focus issues of the Campaign were identified and common consensus was reached among the network members on campaign strategies. Towards forming new linkages, the Campaign reached out to schools, colleges, NGOs and market. A number of capacity building workshops have been organized by the youths and exchanges and exposure visits were conducted to create a space for cross-learning among the youths. The youth campaign will continue with the objectives to call on climate actions as per previous strategies. The network will intervene to promote through developing more contacts with schools, colleges, local institutions NGOs and the Campaign on identified issues of reuse, reduce and recycle, waste segregation, biodiversity preservation, call on cl climate actions supporting theme such as Fridays for Future, Climate Strike will be continued, in this year, the capacity building of youth will also have the additional aspect of gender justice and gender roles – in the climate of increasing gender based violence, the Core Committee members of the Youth Network have asserted the need to discuss critical issues such as gender as part of their youth network activities, although ecology and sustainable development will continue to be the main focus areas. Children were also taken to Botanical gardens in Kolkata to have an understanding of the different flora and fauna.

Promoting Right to play being an integral part of the Project Children participated in weekly Rugby practice sessions and Winter camps organised by Jungle Crows Foundation.



The above Project ended in December 2022

Local to Global Strengthening, Capacity Building & Networking of Youth led activities for right to a Clean and Healthy Environment sponsored by BMZ and Terre des Hommes, Germany

This Project was initiated in July 2022. The project is being implemented in 3 Countries India, Nepal and Pakistan. In India it is being implemented in 13 States situated in all 4 zones — East, West, North and South. In each zone there is a Lead Organisation and LGWCDC was selected as the Lead Organisation for the Eastern Zone. Under this Project LGWCDC got the opportunity to expand its wings to two other neighbouring States - Jharkhand and Odisha. At present the project is being implemented in Kolkata, North & South 24 Pargana District of West Bengal, Koderma, Giridih & Pakur Districts of Jharkhand and Raygada and Kalahandi District in Odisha.

Formation of Core Committee

The first step of this Project was formation of Core Committee Youth Group. This group was formed by selecting 20 active members from the respective State Youth Group Networks already formed earlier in 2012. Regular meeting of the Youth Group and Core Committee were held where they discussed on climate related local issues and probable remedies for the same.







Capacity Building Workshops

These workshops were focussed on Gender Roles, Equity and equality, biodiversity and Climate literacy.









Climate action by Youths

Important climate days like Earth Day, Environment Day, Mangrove Day, Forest day, Water day etc were observed. Global action Month and Child rights week were also observed. The Core Committee Youths performed street plays at various locations in Kolkata, Titagarh and Sundarbans to aware the community people on Environmental Protection. Flagship programs were initiated like Ganga Clean up Drive, Ganga Sagar clean up Drive and Stop Engine at Red Signal campaign.

















School workshops

Workshops were held in Schools to raise awareness among students on Climate change, Environmental protection and general Comment 26.





Stake Holder Meeting

Stake holder meetings were also held where youths placed their Charter of Demands and requested local authorities to look into the issues and bring about policy level changes.









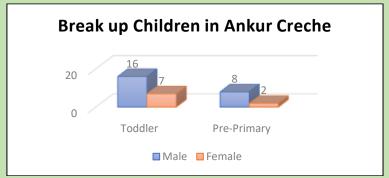
Activities supported by Own Funds of LGWCDC

Ankur Creche

The creche is running successfully for the past 2 years with funds generated locally. Due to huge demand in the community we were compelled to increase the number of children from 25 to 30. Currently however 33 children are enrolled and the average attendance is 25-26 daily. Here also children are divided in two groups- Toddler (1-3.5 yrs) and Pre-Primary (3.5-5 yrs). Educators sit with the groups and impart Early Childhood Education through joyful learning methods. The

children are also provided with supplementary nutrition and mid- day meal as per advice of Consultant Dietitian. Monthly parents meeting is held to discuss on progress of child. In April 2022, 32 children continued in creche. During the year, there have been 37 new admissions, 15 dropouts and 14 children were mainstreamed.





Computer Training Centre

This program is also running successfully and students as well as their parents specially mothers are also enrolled in the course. Currently the basic and Advanced courses of Windows is being imparted but there is a huge demand for DTP and Financial Accounting.



Rotary Community Corps (RCC) Activities

LGWCDC was chartered as an RCC of Rotary Club of Calcutta Sutanuti in the year 2020. Since then, it has been working in close association with the sponsoring club. In June 2022, LCWCDC was awarded for their activities in Rota year 21-22. The Organisation received 2nd prize in Vocational Training and Mother & Child Care and 3rd Prize in Health & Hygiene and Literacy and Overall 3rd Best Organising RCC. During the year the following programs were conducted.

Know your numbers health camp

On 1st July a Know your numbers Health camp was held were 138 persons attended. All were checked for their Height, Weight, BMI, Blood Pressure Random Sugar ECG and Blood Group. The

camp was held in association with Health Club. Members from RC Calcutta Sutanuti were present along with Vice Governor of RID 3291 PDG Pinaki Prasad Ghosh.



Awareness session on Domestic Violence and Consumer Protection

An awareness session on Domestic Violence and Consumer protection was held at Atithi Hall, Santoshpur, Budge Budge in association with RC Calcutta Sutanuti, RC Salt lake Central and District Legal Aid Services Authority 24pgs(S). The session was facilitated by Mr.Shubra Kantii Dhar, Secretary DLSA, Adv Nishad Ara Begum, Adv. Rtn.Subir Chatterjee, Adv.PP Rtn Abir Mukherjee and Adv.PP Rtn.Anjan Ray. An effective interaction was held on pending and filed cases. 6 Rotarians were present during the session.







Sampreeti

Nobel laureate Gurudev Rabindranath Tagore in protest against the division of Bengal in 1905 promoted unity and brotherhood by tying a tread (Rakhi) on each others hand specially the Muslim Brethren. Keeping this in mind in association with RC Calcutta Sutanuti a session n Communal harmony was organised at Manasi Hall Santoshpur on 12th August 2022. Rakhis were tied on each others hands, Discussions were held on promoting Peace and harmony and patriotic poems and songs were recited and sung.135 persons attended the program. 7 Rotarians were present during the Program







Colouring and Cultural Activity

RCC Lake Gardens in association with RC Calcutta Sutanuti organised a colouring and cultural activity at Nandan Kananan kindergarten and play school in Lake Gardens Kolkata on 15th

September 2022. 50 children participated in the program. Each were given a colouring book, a box of crayons, a packet of biscuit and a toffee. 2 Rotarians were present during the event.



Awareness session on Safe Drinking Water

An awareness session on safe drinking water was held for the primary section students of Rajendra Sikhsa Sadan at Tollygunj Kolkata in association with RC Calcutta Sutanuti on 21st September 2022. 26 students of classes 3,4 and 5 attended the session. All of them were given a small refreshment. 1 Rotarian were present during the session.



Awareness on Proper Handwashing Technique

An awareness session on proper hand washing technique as a preventive method of covid was held on 22nd September 2022 at Rajnarayan Junior Basic school, Kasba, Kolkata in association with RCC Lake gardens women and children development Centre. 30 children of classes 1-5 attended the session. The session was facilitated by RCC members. 2 Rotarians were present during the session.



Environmental Education

Awareness session on Ecology and environment issues was conducted on 7th December 2023 at Khidderpore Milani Girls High School in association with RCC Lake Gardens WCDC. 30 students of classes 9 and 10 attended the session along with 7 teachers. The session was facilitated by Ms. Farida Bano, WB State Coordinator of LGWCDC.





Rotavision- Free Eye Check- up Camp & Spectacle Distribution Camp

Rotavision Camp was held on 17th January 2023 in association with RC Calcutta Sutanuti at Lake Gardens Supermarket area . 115 persons attended the camp, 86 were detected with vision problems and 27 were detected with cataract and referred for surgery. 1 Rotarian was present during the camp.







Legal Aid awareness on Child Marriage and Child Labour

An awareness session on prohibition of Child Marriage and Child labour was held on 23rd March 2023 at Manashi Hall Santoshpur in association with RC Calcutta Sutanuti and District Legal Aid Services Authority, 24 PGS (S). Mr. Shubra Kanti Dhar, Secretary, DLSA and Adv. Annindita Kundu facilitated the session. Discussions were held on penal measures against parents if they engage in marrying their children at early age and or engaging them in child labour. 125 persons attended the program. 2 Rotarians were present during the session.





Our Virangana's

The Determined Lady

Nasreen is a young lady of 24 years. She lives in a slum community in the southern fringes of West Bengal. Due to poor economic condition in the family, she was married off by her parents at an early age of 15 years. She however had a dream of completing her schooling and join college and become a teacher. But destiny had different plans for her. At the age of 17, she became a mother and she was engaged full time in doing household chores and taking care of her child. But her passion for studies did not leave her. When she was 19 yrs, she became determined that she would restart her studies. She faced a lot of opposition from her in-laws, her own family as well as community. They all chided her that it was time for her son to get admitted in school and not her getting admitted in college. But she did not pay heed and got herself admitted in college, in regular course to complete her 12th Board exams. During that time an NGO working in the locality started forming women's group to empower the women and bring about sustainable development changes. Nasreen joined one group at the first opportunity and attended the meetings regularly. From there she received several trainings on leadership, saving-loaning, business, etc. Since it was a micro-credit group, she took a loan from the group and started a school stationery counter. The NGO also started a coaching Centre for the children and Nasreen applied for the post of Teacher and was selected. She wonderfully manages her family duties as a mother, wife, daughter-in-law, daughter along with her own studies, managing the stationery shop and the coaching centre. She passed her 12th Boards successfully and joined College with Honours in Philosophy under Calcutta University. As a next step in sustainable community development, the NGO started forming Cluster Level Association (CLA) by selecting active members from the Women's Group and Nasreen was unanimously elected as one of the members in the CLA. Her responsibilities increased as she had to now assist her community people in their crisis moments. She excelled in this also. The West Bengal Government holds camps in communities called "Duyarey Sarkar" where people can apply for citizenship documents, different schemes and rectify their documents. Nasreen is a regular volunteer in these Camps where she assists her community people in filling up the necessary forms. Recently she passed her Graduation exams with First Class marks and is preparing to join the Post-Graduation course so that her dream of becoming a teacher is fulfilled.

An Empowered Woman

Mrs.Sardar is 30 yrs old and lives in a slum in South Kolkata. She is a mother of six children. Her husband is a casual worker and most of time is under the influence of alcohol. She was in dire states as single handedly she had to bring up all her children. Our Project Team came in contact with her when she approached them to admit her youngest child (daughter) to our creche. The child was then 1yr old. The child was very neglected as her mother did not have time for her running between houses to complete her work as a domestic help. Her eldest daughter eloped at the age of 14 yrs. She was told to lodge a complaint at the Police Station and Child line Office but she was reluctant and later told that her daughter has married and is well in her in-laws place. Last year her second daughter was molested by an elderly man of the community, again the Project Team told her to lodge a complaint initially she was very reluctant but later she lodged an FIR. The man was arrested and a case was initiated under

POCSO Act. She has received an order of rehabilitation compensation for her daughter which is now under process. Since her youngest daughter started coming to creche in every meeting she was advised to adopt a permanent family planning method. But she was very reluctant and had lot of misconceptions. Initially she started taking contraceptive pills and through several sessions her misconceptions were removed. Finally, she agreed to go for ligation and now she is one of the mascots in the community motivating all other women to undergo ligation. Next year her youngest child will also get admitted to a formal school.

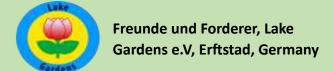
The Activist

She was a student of first batch of Creche of LGWCDC in 2005 and later a student of the Remedial Coaching Centre of LGWCDC. Though coming from extremely humble and very simple background, it did not deter her from achieving good academic records as she scored 62 % marks in class X, Madhyamik examination in 2018. And performed even better in class XII, H.S. examination as she notched up 81 % marks.

When Shampa was in class VI, she got a stipend from LGWCDC for one year i.e. 2014. Again, she got Scholarship from LGWCDC after completion of H.S. examination in 2020. She completed her graduation in History Hons. with First class from Jogesh Chandra Chowdhury College, Kolkata in 2023. She is connected with LGWCDC for a long time. She joined the Youth Network of LGWCDC in 2020. She has participated in various district & state conferences and raised her concern on Climate related issues on behalf of her Youth Network. She has a dream to create a Society free from violence against Women where they can enjoy their rights equally as men. That's why She has taken her Education as first priority as Education is the only weapon of Change.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NATURE OF OPERATION:

Lake Gardens Women and Children Development Centre LGWCDC) is a non profit organisation founded in 1992 by social scientist Cecilie Sircar and her husband Late Shyamal Sircar and is registered under West Bengal Societies Registration Act 1961. The organization initially started with the objective to improve the quality of life of the girl children and women in the shanties along the railway track between Dhakuria and Lake gardens station under jurisdiction of the Municipal Corporation of Kolkata.

In the beginning of the organisation LGWCDC adopted a centre based integrated holistic development approach wherein joyful and remedial educational opportunities for mainstreaming, health care, vocational skill development for income generation.

The core value of the organisation is to render service to the marginalised children and women living in the slums along the railway tracks near to Lake Gardens Station, as well as Howrah and South 24 Parganas, West Bengal and is increasingly involved in community development and the eradication of malnourishment. Our work covers around 20,000 beneficiaries till date.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING

2.01 Basis of Preparation of Financial

The Financial Statements have been prepared to comply in all material aspects with the notified Accounting Standards issued by ICAI. The Financial Statements are prepared under historical cost convention, on accrual basis except grant / donation received which is accounted

2.02 Use of Estimates

The preparation of Financial Statements in conformity with the Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) requires Management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent liabilities at the date of the Financial Statement and the result of the operations during the reporting year end. Although these assumptions are made as per the Management's best knowledge of current events and actions, actual result may differ from these estimates.

2.03 Fixed Assets Tangible

All Tangible Fixed Assets have been stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment loss, if any. Cost comprises the purchase price and any attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use.

2.04 Depreciation and Amortization.

Depreciation on Tangible Fixed Assets has been provided on the Written Down Value method at the rates adopted by the Management. The rates are disclosed in Note 6: Fixed Assets.

2.05 Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Society and the revenue can be reliably

Grant and Donation Incomes are recognized on cash basis and other incomes are recognized on accrual basis.

2.06 Taxes on Income

Current Tax: The Society got registration under section 12A of Income Tax Act, 1961 as Charitable Non-Government Organization vide Unique Registration no. AAAAL7635DE20214 dated 25/05/2021 with validity from AY 2022-23 to AY 2026-27. As per the above registration all incomes from all of its charitable activities are expected under section 11 of the said Act.

Deferred Tax is the tax effect on timing difference(s). Since the society enjoys tax exemption under section 11, no Deferred Tax Assets or Deferred Tax Liabilities have been recognized.

2.07 Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and Cash equivalents in the Financial Statement comprise cash in hand and unrestricted cash at Bank and short term Investments with an original maturity of three months or less.

2.08 Contingent Liability and

Contingent liability is disclosed for (i) possible obligations which will be confirmed only by future not wholly within the control of the Society or (ii) present obligations arising from past events where it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation or a reliable estimate of the amount of the obligation cannot be made. Contingent asset is not recognized in the financial statements since this may result in the recognition of income that may never be realized.
